| Task details | <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Read each piece of travel writing and annotate each text for typical features of travel writing.2. Identify the audience and the purpose for each text.3. Using your reading and analysis, respond to the following question: Compare the two texts written by different writers at different times as examples of travel writing. In your response:<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Consider relevant contextual factors• Consider the attitudes and values that the writers present• Make sure to use terminology and quotations to support your ideas• Aim to write between 500 – 700 words |
