	<ul> <li>Rhythm and Pitch in staff notation (this should include clefs, names and values of notes, rests, accidentals, time signatures, key signatures and intervals)</li> <li>Rhythm and Pitch in alternative forms of notation (such as tab, drum notation, chord charts, lead sheet, graphic scores and tonic sol-fa)</li> <li>How tempo, dynamics and expression can be notated (metronome markings, dynamic markings, articulation and instrumental techniques)</li> <li>You should include explanations of these features, and include examples from actual notation.</li> </ul>
